MISSION AND TASKS

MISSION

Provide air support of Fleet Marine Force operations by destruction of surface targets.

TASKS

- 1. Conduct close air support.
- 2. Conduct strikes against enemy installations, armed reconnaissance and interdiction operations.
 - 3. Conduct visual reconnaissance.
 - 4. Provide smoke laying, illumination and insecticide spraying.
- 5. Maintain the capability to perform mission and tasks during darkness.
- 6. Maintain capability to depart from and return to base during all-weather conditions.

Marine Attack Squadron 251, was located at K-6 Airbase, Pyongtack, Korea during the period 1 through 31 May 1954.

During the month of May this squadron flew a total of 566 effective sorties with 20 aborts, for a total of 1002.7 operational hours. The average number of pilots available during the month was 24 or 75% of the pilots assigned. The average number of aircraft available for flight was 14 or 70% of the aircraft assigned. Pilots completed 62.3% of the Quarterly Syllabus for the period 1 April 1954 to 30 June 1954.

Between 4 May and 14 May 1954, nine (9) pilots, two (2) loading teams and six (6) AD-4B aircraft, plus the necessary maintenance personnel participated in loading Operations of Special Weapons at NAS, Atsugi, Japan.

Three (3) "Yellow and two (2) "Red" alerts were sounded during the month of May. One "Yellow" alært was sounded on 27 May and lasted from 1728 to 1808. A "Yellow" alert was sounded at 1204 on 27 May and the All Clear came at 1228. A "Yellow" alert was sounded at 1034 on 18 May and at 1035 a "Red" alert was sounded. The All Clear came at 1124. A "Red" alert was sounded at 1327 on 8 May and the All Clear was sounded at 1337.

On 23 May this squadron participated in the rehersal phase of MARLEX V and on the 25th of May six (6) aircraft provided simulated night Close Air Support for the maneuver, using Flares to illuminate the target area.

The Squadron Insigna. Black Fatch, was approved by CNO and is enclosed as Enclosure (1) to Appendix XI.

On 31 May, two (2) search missions were flown by this squadron. This search was conducted for two (2) METEOR aircraft reported down in the FREE TRADE area.

Fourteen (14) men were joined, one (1) man was transferred to VMA-212, leaving our strength at 53, roughly ninty per cent (90%) of our strength of the allotted T/O.

MATERIAL SUMMARY

During the month of May 1954 there were 352 stub requisitions submitted. There were nineteen (19) ACOG's submitted with eighteen (18) completed. One hundred and thirty-nine (139) priority "A" were submitted with ninty-three (93) completed. One hundred and ninty-four (194) priority "C" submitted with one hundred and forty-one (141) completed.

During the month of May, One (1) Officer and six enlisted men were assigned to the Material Section.

The Construction Battalion is completing the extention on the Material building, this will provide adequate storage space for all equipment and supplies.

SPECIAL WEAFONS MONTHLY SUMMARY

Training continued during the month emphasizing high altitude 70° dive bombing on the ranges available. The ranges available locally are not satisfactory as they have no dive angle calibration equipment, and are designed for low altitude releases. Work is in progress at ASAN-MAN to construct a suitable range with dive angle calibration equipment. Training in lob bombing technique was begun but no drops will be made until the six AD-4Bs have been modified for lob bombined elivery. The necessary equipment was placed on order and the aircraft will be modified locally upon its resiept.

Ground school for pilots on wearons circuitry, components, normal operations and malfunctions and operation of test and control equipment was continued.

Between the fourth and the thirteenth of May a loading excrcise was conducted at MAS Atsugi, Japan, Six (6) AD-4B and nine (9) pilots and two (2) loading crews plus seven (7) maintenance personnel participated in the operation. All the pilots made heavy load takeoffs with both the MK-VII and MK VIII and made in flight checks with the T-63 and T-64 weapons. The loading crews made fit checks with both weapons on all six (6) aircraft. Six (6) pilots made low altitude JADF penetration flights against three (3) targets on the island of HONSHU simulating special weapons delivery. A total of one hundred and forty-three (143) MK-76 bombs were dropped on the MITO high altitude bombing range. A total of one hundred and twenty-nine hours were flown during the operation.
