THE COMMANDING OFFICER

Lieutenant Colonel Robert J. HOIM 07498/7302/5605 USMC assumed command of Marine Attack Squadron 251 "The Black Patch" squadron on November twenty-second 1954.

A graduate of St. Olaf College and the California Institute of Technology, Colonel HOLM received his Commission and Wings in November 1941.

During World War II he served in the Marshall Islands campaign, and some of his duty stations being Cherry Point, North Carolina, MCAS, El Toro, California, and the Bureau of Ordnance in Washington, D.C.

Lieutemant Colonel HOIM began his present tour of Juty overseas in July 1954.

INTRODUCTORY SUNMARY

Marine Attack Squadron 251, was located at K-6 Airbase, Fyongtack, Korea during the period 1 October through 31 December 1954.

The mission and tasks assigned this organization are: 1/

Mission: To provide air support of Fleet Marine Force Operation by destruction of surface targets.

Tasks

1. Conduct close air support.

2. Conduct armed reconnaissance, interdiction operations, and strikes against enemy nstallations.

3. Provide fog smoke laying, illumination and insecticide spraying.

4. Maintain capability to operate from aircraft carriers.

5. Maintain capability to operate during darkness, and under instrument flight conditions.

On the twenty-first of November, Major Thomas B. WCOD 014612/7331 USM was detached to CONUS while Lieutenant Colonel Robert J. HOLM 07498/7302/5 USMC, assumed command of the squadron on the twenty-second of November 195.

During this quarter, WMA-251 the "Black Patch" squadron, led all squa rons on the airbase in hours flown per month, for all three months. Total hours for this period were 3078.1, with 951.4 for October, 1181.4 for November, and 945.3 for December. Sorties for the quarter ere 1694, with 36 aborts for the quarter. Total effective sorties were 1658. 2/

The average number of aircraft available for flight were sixty-eight (68%) of the aircraft assigned, while the average number of pilots available were eighty percent (80%) of the pilots assigned. Twelve instrument cards were renewed during the quarter, with three (3) in October, six (6) in November and three (3) in December.

There was one "Yellow Alert" on the 28th of Docomber, the first for the quarter, with the siren sounding at 2148 and the "All Clear" sounding at 2216. No aircraft were dispersed.

There were no aircraft accidents this quarter. This is attributed to the fact that VMA-251 requires the "best" from each man available.

A new hanger was opened for the engineering department, and a squadron party was given which was one of the best in several months.

PERSONNEL (S-1) SECTION SUMMARY

The Squadron detached its Commanding Officer, Major Thomas B. WOOD on 21 November 1954 and joined Lieutenant Colonel Robert J. HOIM as Commanding Officer on 22 November 1954.

During the quarter, the squadron had an average number of 33 NA's and 2 AGO's and 185 enlisted men. There were 35 Officers, (34 NA's and 1 AGO) and 188 enlisted men on hand as of 2400 31 December 1954. The Squadron's T/O is 58 Officers, (53 NA's and 5 AGO's) and 220 enlisted men.

During the quarter, 1 Officer and 2 Enlisted men were on normal TAD, and 11 Officers and 56 enlisted men were on TAD in excess of 30 days. 5 enlisted men were on leave during the quarter.

Two (2) officers were given Active Duty Contracts during the quarter.

The following men were reenlisted for a period of three (3) years: Corporals John T. CROWE 1334918/6511 USMC, Jack L. TUTWILER 1325038/6511 USMC, and Kurt H. SCHOENFELDT 1044419/6413 USMC.

Eight Officers submitted requests for integration during the quarter.

The squadron Special Services planned, and supervised two (2) parties during the quarter. The outstanding was a Christmas party given for the Orphans from the Chain Hai Orphanage. The squadron entertained thirty (30) orphans. Each child was escorted by a member of the squadron. Santa Claus arrived by helicopter, to give each child a coat. The children were served the evening meal at the enlisted mess hall. The Christmas Spirit of the men of the squadron was greatly enhanced by having these children helping to celebrate Christmas Day.

During the quarter, the education department was busy giving tests, supervising the instructions of the men enrolled in correspondence courses, and interviewing new men. Forty-eight (48) members of the squadron were newly enrolled in correspondence courses during the quarter, and six (6) final examinations were administered. A plan is now underway to commence night study classes, to prepare the members of the squadron who do not have a high school diplomation the high school equivalency tests.

During the quarter WMA-251 continued to lead all other squadrons at K-6 in hours flown each month, and completed the quarter with a total of 30 H.1 hour, flown. There were no aircraft accidents during this quarter.

A total of 1694 sorties were flown during the quarter; 558 in October, 618 in November, and 518 in Dadember. There were a total of 36 aborts, with 17 for October 4 for November, and 15 for December. Of the total hours of 3078.1 flown, 951 4 were flown in October, 1181.4 in November, and 945.3 in Dadember. The average number of pilots available were 27 or 80% of the pilots assigned. The average number of aircraft for flight were 13 or 68% of the aircraft assigned. The squadron completed 90% of the quarterly flight syllabus. A turn-over in pilot personnel of approximately 25% occured during the quarter. Pilot ground training continued at an accelerated pace on ground training days, including lectures, flight safety, reviewing of accident reports, instrument techniques, aircraft identification, operational procedures, cold weather flight survival techniques (by the flight surgeon), bavigation and supply dicipline.
