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INTRODUCTORY SUMMARY

Marine Attack Squadron 251 was located at K-3 airbase, Pohang, Korea during the period from 1 April through 30 June 1955. Marine Attack Squadron 251, having just recently moved to K-3 airbase from K-6 airbase. Pyongtaek, Korea shortly before this quarter began, was in the process of getting the new squadron area shipshape. The interior of all offices were painted as were the dining rooms and club buildings. There is ample space for quarters and they are above average for living conditions.

The mission and tasks assigned this organization are:1

Mission: To provide air support of Fleet Marine Force Operation by destruction of surface targets.

Tasks:

1. Conduct close air support.

2. Conduct armed reconnaissance, interdiction operations, and strikes against enemy installations.

3. Provide for fog smoke laying, illumination, and insecticide spraying.

4. Maintain capability to operate from aircraft carriers.
5. Maintain capability to operate during darkness, and under instrument flight conditions.

The Commander of the squadron since November 22, 1954 is Lieutenant Colonel Robert J. HOLM 07498/7331 USMC.

During this quarter, VMA-251, the "Black Patch" squadron, led all squadrons in Marine Aircraft Group 12 in hours flown per month for all three months. Total hours for this period were 4964.6 (1509.7 for April, 1771.3 for May, and 1683.6 for June 1955).

Sorties for the quarter were 2105 with 26 aborts for the quarter. There were 679 sorties for April. 736 for May. and 690 for June. Total effective sorties were 2079. Since VMA-251 has a detachment at Atsugi, Japan the Chronological Narrative will not carry a daily breakdown of hours and sorties of the detachment. They will be shown in footnotes and in the statistical summary.²

The average number of aircraft available for flight was 69% of the aircraft assigned, while the average number of pilots available was 70% of the pilots assigned. Eight (8) instrument cards were renewed during the quarter. Three (3) in April, Two (2) in May, and Three (3) in June.

There were no "Alerts" this quarter. However the squadron does have an aircraft disposal plan in case of attack. Training is still being carried out with the APS-19 radar search gear.

There were two aircraft accidents this quarter. The first was caused by material failure or malfunction. First Lieutenant Lloyd C. DILLON 064551/7331 was forced to make a wheels up emergency landing at A-27. located at Pyongtaek, Korea. There were no injuries to the pilot. This accident occured on 3 June 1955. The second accident occured on 30 June 1955, when Captain William D. THAYER Sr. 055064/7331 ground looped on landing at K-3 airbase. The sircraft accident Board has not determined the cause or extent of damage as yet.

On 1 May First Lieutenant Robert A. GILLON 060541/7331 was leading an MLR reconnaissance flight along the 38th paralell when he received gunfire damage to his port wing. The gunfire was of undetermined origin. The pilot received no injuries and he brought the aircraft safely home. The port wing was replaced quickly and the plane was back in commission after only two days.

INTRODUCTORY SUMMARY (CONT'D)

Morale was at an all time high this quarter. This is due to the high percentage of aircraft availability which allowed everyone to fly almost daily and left no one with idle time during working hours. A promotion party was given by pilots of VMA-251 to which VMA-121 was invited. Charcoal broiled steaks and movies provided the entertainment.

There were numberous other Sunday afternoon parties for officers and enlisted men.

2During this quarter the Special Weapon Detachment at Atsugi, Japan flew 511 sorties for a total of 971 hours. During April the detachment flew 195 sorties for 350.6 hours, during May they flew 150 sorties for 267.6 hours and for June they flew 166 sorties for a total of 352.8 hours. These totals of 511 sorties and 971 hours for the quarter added to the home units 1594 sorties and 3993.6 hours gives VMA-251 a total of 2105 sorties and 4964.6 hours. Also during this quarter VMA-251 aircraft went to Atsugi, Japan and were attached to the Special Weapons Detachment temporarily for Close Air Support exercises. Four aircraft were attached from 18 April to 23 April 1955, and four were attached from 8 May until 19 May 1955. The June exercises were from the 5th until the 16th.

During the month of June pilot training was held on the 1st, 8th, 15th, and 22nd. On the 8th lectures were given on Civil Air Regulation 60, Mark III Plotting Board, Night Flying, and ABC Warfare. An all pilots meeting was held at the end of the period. On the 15th lectures were given on the Korean and World situation, Aircraft Inspection, Sensations of Flight, and Extreme Hot Weather Procedure. The lectures were followed by a safety review and an all pilots meeting. Basic training for enlisted personnel was held on the 1st, 8th, 15, 22nd, 27th, and 29th of June. On the 1st lectures were given on Marine Corps Policy, Technique of Instruction, Quizs were given on Technique of Instruction, and Shelter Tents. On the 15th lectures were given on the 45 Cal. Pistol. Communism, and the Technique of Command. A quiz was given on the 45 Cal. Pistol. On the 22nd lectures were given on Motor Vehicle Accident Prevention, Rifle and Hand Grenadda and ABC Warfare. A quiz was given on the Technique of Command. On the 27th a lecture was given on the U.S. Rifle Cal. 30 MI. On the 29th lectures were given on individual protection, and ABC Warfare. A Medical lecture was given by Doctor Taggert from MAG-12 Dispensery.

A total of 166 sorties for 352.8 hours by the Detachment added to the 524 sorties and 1330.8 hours for the home unit gives a total of 690 sorties and 1683.6 hours for the month of June.

OPERATIONS (8-3) SECTION SUMMARY

For the quarter ending 30 June, 1955, VMA-251 continued to lead all other Squadrons in MAG-12. The quarter was completed with a total of 4964.6 hours flown. A total of 2105 sorties were flown during the quarter, 679 in April, 736 in May, 690 in June. There was a total of 26 Aborts, with 6 for April, 8 for May, and 12 for June. Of the total hours flown, 1509.7 were flown in April, 1771.3 in May, and 1683.6 in June. The average number of pilots available were 32 or 70 % of the pilots assigned. The average number of aircraft for flight was 16 or 69 % of aircraft assigned. The Squadron completed 90 % of the quarterly flight syllabus. A turnover in pilot personnel of approximately 40 % occurred during this quarter. Pilot Ground Training continued on Ground Training and foul weather days, including lectures on Flight Safety, review of accident reports, instrument technique, aircraft identification, operational and cold weather procedures, mavigation and supply discipline.

Eight (8) instrument cards were renewed during the quarter. Those renewed were issued to LtCol. Robert J. HOLM 07498/7331 USMC, 1stLt. David L. ALTHOFF 064955/7331 USMCR, 1stLt. Dorald C. HEIM 064593/7331 USMCR, 1stLt. Robert S. REED 064961/7331 USMCR, 2ndLt. Albert H. BERG 065420/7333 USMCR, 2ndLt. Walter T. BURTON 066591/7331 USMCR, 2ndLt. Chauncey F. CIARK 065972/7333 USMCR, 2ndLt. James C. RHODES 066533/7333 USMCR.

There was an aircraft accident on 3 June, 1955 resulting in strike damage to AL-8, BuNo. 123900. The pilot 1stLt. Hoyd C. DILION 064551/7331 was uninjured. It. DILION flying AL-8, BuNo. 123900 had an internal engine failure, cause undetermined, at A-27 on a tactical Close Air Support flight. A successful wheels up landing was made and Lt. DILLON was uninjured. The aircraft was transferred on 10 June, 1955. The Aircraft Accident Board determined the accident's primary cause was material failure or malfunction. Further investigation is being conducted on the engine to determine the cause of the accident.

lstLt. Robert A. GILLON 060541/7331 was hit by a missile of undetermined origin while flying AL-2 BuNo. 128981 on an Armed Reconnaissance Mission. The damage incurred resulted in a wing change, but no injury to the pilot. A flash report of the incident was forwarded through the chain of command.

On 30 June, 1955, Captain Willaim D. THAYER Sr. 055064/7331 flying AL-14 BuNo, 123839 ground looped on landing at K-3 Airbase. The Aircraft Accident Board has not determined the cause or extent of damage as of this date,

Completion of service tours are as follows: AD-4 BuNo. 123898. 4/4/55; AD-4 BuNo. 123929, 5/6/55; AD-4 BuNo. 123900, 6/10/55.

SPECIAL WEAFONS SUMMARY

During the period of this report progress in Special Weapons training continued at a high rate. Training in high altitude, high angle dive bombing and low level loft bombing techniques were continued. Considerable emphasis was placed on low level navigation training and numerous flights carrying the T-63 shape were conducted.

In accordance with 1stMAW Operations Order 7-55 this unit conducted a Special Weapons exercise during the period of 9 May to 13 May 1955. During this exercise the unit was under the Operational Control of Commanding Officer, MAG-11. Shikoku Island was designated as enemy territory and targets were picked for possible strikes. During the course of the exercise seven (7) targets were selected. The unit performed all necessary planing to execute Atomic strikes on these targets. Three (3) missions were successfully completed. Two (2) of these missions were MK-7 Mod 3 drops while the other was a MK-8 drop. One (1) mission, with the T-63 shape, aborted to NAS Iwakuni and remained overnight in order to exercise the MWSG-17 Bomb Disposal Team.

The remaining four (4) missions were aborted due to weather conditions, both enroute and over the target area.

Fighter cover during the exercise was provided by FJ-2 aircraft from VMF-451.

One (1) pilot and one (1) ordnance officer were transferred to CONUS during the period. Major V. J. FEEBLES 021948/7331/6510/7305 was transferred on 17 April 1955, and First Lieutenant N. BERRY 055402/6510 was transferred on 20 April 1955. One (1) ordnance officer First Lieutenant John L. WHITE 055721/6510 was attached on 28 March 1955.

The unit has four (4) qualified delivery pilots assigned with one (1) pilot operationally qualified only. Over 375 Special Weapons missions were flown during the period. The flight training syllabus is currently seventy-five percent (75%) complete. Close Air Support training with the 3rd Marine Division was conducted by pilots from Korea.

A total of 971 aircraft hours were flown. Eleven (11) major and twenty-seven (27) intermediate checks were pulled during this quarter. Average availability was four (4) aircraft.
