h. Close Air Support

During this reporting period VMFA-251 provided Close Air Support for AO School, 2nd MARDIC, and 2nd ANGLICO.

i. Civil Affairs

During this reporting period two groups of children from the Beaufort area schools were guests of the squadron. While here they were given a presentation on the F-4B Phantom Jet.

3. Narrative Summary of Events

VMFA-251 started the first half of Fiscal Year 1970 under the command of LtCol R. O. LAWRENCE. The squadron had 16 F-4B aircraft assigned as of 1 July 1969 with 12 aircraft on hand.

During this reporting period while training aircrewmen for WESTPAC replacement, VMFA-251 flew a total of 2,617.0 accident free hours, accumulating 872 syllabus credits. Aircrew training resulted in transferring 24 aircrewmen to WESTPAC in a combat ready posture.

From 17 August 1969 to 6 September 1969, VMFA-251 was deployed to MCAS Yuma, Arizona. While there the squadron flew 353 air to ground sorties for 529.3 flight hours accounting for 358 syllabus credits. The squadron participated in numerous bombing runs in the Chocolate Mountain area, carrying different types of ordnance. The training accomplished through the utilization of HML-267's OV-10 was absolutely realistic and the most valuable of the deployment.

On September 6, 1969, VMFA-251 became the first unit of any branch of the Armed Forces to complete 25,000 accident free hours in the F-4 Phantom Jet. Mr James WALKER of McDonnell Douglas Aircraft Corporation presented LtCol R. O. LAWRENCE, a plaque commending the squadron for its outstanding safety record.

During the period from 14-16 October 1969, VMFA-251 conducted a self-contained missile shoot firing a total of 16 Sidewinders and 4 Sparrow missiles as part of its continuing program to keep at a high peak of combat readiness. This effort qualified 15 replacement aircrews in the firing of these missiles.

On 29 October 1969, the squadron participated in Exercise SNOWTIME 70-2-E.

During the period 3-7 November 1969, VMFA-251 participated in a MAG-31 AIM 7D FIREX, flying a total of 29 sorties for 51.0 hours and firing 9 Missiles.

During the reporting period, LtCol R. O. LAWRENCE promoted a total of 7 Officers and 142 Enlisted.
