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e. Special Operations

VMFA-251 began the reporting period under the command of Lt Col R. P. LEE. During the six month period the squadron flew 1,368 sorties and 1,929.5 hours accomplishing 598 syllabus training credits.

During the month of January 1972, VMFA-251 continued its partie cipation as agressors in the Second Marine Aircraft Wing and Second Marine Division command post exercise "Blue Ax". Between 1 January and the conclusion of the operation on 7 January, 23 sorties and 46.9 hours were flown in support of the exercise.

Training emphasis shifted to air combat maneuvering during the second week in January in preparation for "College Dart" - 1972. "College Dart" is a joint service exercise in air combat tactics sponsored by the Air Defense Command, USAF. The squadron deployed six aircraft and six aircrews to Tyndall Air Force Base between 17 January and 22 January. Aircrews competed against the F-106 aircraft from the 318th Fighter Interceptor Squadron in two-vs-two, four-vs-four and fighter excort missions. The experiences derived from "College Dart" proved to be invaluable as the assets within the 2d Marine Aircraft Wing cannot support this type of training.


On 24 January 1972, Major M. R. MCDONOUGH relieved Major W. T. MCFALL as squadron Executive Officer.

Squadron personnel departed for a deployment to NAS, Key West on 25 January. Six aircraft and rotation of aircrews provided excellent utilization of resources and maximized syllabus training. The deployement, which ended on 14 February 1972, yielded 117 syllabus training credits in 144 sorties and 248.6 hours.

On 14 March 1972, the squadron again assumed hot pad duties at NAS, Key West with ten aircraft. Five aircraft were committed to alert duties and the remainder were utilized for extensive aircrew training. Air combat maneuvering continued to have a high priority as two-vs-one and two-vs-two sorties were flown against the A-4M's of VMA-324. During the deployment, two weeks were devoted to air to ground ordnance 'delivery on the Avon Park target complex. The squadron flew 320 sorties, 450 hours and accomplished 168 training credits during the month long deployment.

On 19 April 1972 at 0200, a Marine Aircraft Group 31 rapid recall exercise was initiated. Within two hours, the squadron was at 100% strength Five hours after notification, eight aircraft were launched, In all 16 sorties and 23.3 hours were flown during the simulated contingency.

Eight aircrews participated in a Phase II missile shoot on the Cherry Point Missile Range between 1 and 5 May 1972. Five aircrews were qualified during the shoot. A total of 5 Sparrow and 3 Sidewinder:



Between 8-12 May 1972 the squadron hosted aircrews from Marine Air Weapons Training Unit, Atlantic for an air combat tacties instruction The evaluation included knowledge of Tactical Manual procedures, briefing and debriefing and airborne instruction. As a result of this course, four aircrews were designated hir Combat Tactics Instructors.

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On 23 June 1972, Major J. C. BYRAM JR. relieved Lt Col R. P. LEE as Commanding Officer.

Between 25-30 June four aircraft and five aircrews were deployed to Tyndall Air Force Base, Florida for the second round of "College Dart". This advanced training with dissimiliar aircraft is invaluable in the air combat environment. During the deployment squadron aircrews recorded 45 Phase III training credits.
